Bay View Historical Society Receives Wisconsin Historical Society's Highest Award

On Monday, October 3rd, the Bay View Historical Society received the Wisconsin Historical Society's prestigious Reuben Gold Thwaites Trophy. Wisconsin Historical Society State Preservation Officer Michael Stevens made the presentation during our membership meeting at the Beulah Brinton Center.

In presenting the award, Stevens referred to our Society's mission statement which "encourages a sense of community by conserving, celebrating and sharing Bay View's rich heritage." He also noted that our vision statement encourages us to "serve as a portal, and archive, for celebrating Bay View's history and promise for the future." He praised those statements, stating that they stress outcomes such as a sense of community, which is rooted very strongly in the present. To illustrate the ways in which the BVHS accomplishes these tenets, Stevens cited the following examples:

• Awareness of importance of place: our

work in historic preservation which ranges from landmarking properties to our purchase of the Beulah Brinton House

- Serving as a community center: annual beer and wine-tasting event, farmers market participation, and involvement with local organizations
- Programs designed to encourage people to interact with history, such as the walking
- Community involvement such as the Bay View Bash

The Reuben Gold Thwaites trophy is the Wisconsin Historical Society's highest recognition of distinction awarded annually to a "historical society for continued excellence for its overall service to its community over a period of at least five years." Historical societies are eligible to receive the award every 25 years. The Bay View Historical Society received the award

25 years ago, seven years after the Society's inception. The Bay View Historical Society was nominated for the 2011 award by society member Ron Winkler.

Bay View Gets Facelift

Northern Bay View along Kinnickinnic Avenue is getting a facelift. Part of that facelift involves demolition of several properties. The first area affected is the intersection of Kinnickinnic Avenue, Lincoln Avenue and Howell Avenue, where the German-American Bank building at 2301-11 S. Kinnickinnic Avenue was demolished to make way for a new Alterra Coffee Roasters shop.

The Neoclassical German-American Bank building was constructed in 1907 for the Merchants Investment Association for \$50,000. It was designed by Herman Esser and George Raulf, Jr. as the German-American Bank until it moved to 2685 S. Kinnickinnic Avenue, where it eventually became the First Wisconsin National Bank. Today that building houses loyce Parker Productions.

In 1930, the German-American Bank building was converted to ten stores. It was home to Kinnickinnic Federal Savings & Loan, which became Maritime Bank.

Alterra purchased the property with hopes of using the building as-is. With time, it became apparent that renovation would be too expensive. The building was razed, and a 13,000-square-foot building with a café and bakery is scheduled to open in July, 2012. Plans include a patio with outdoor seating. Alterra also plans to construct a bus shelter to replace what was previously a bus stop. There will also be more sidewalk space on Lincoln Avenue in front of the building.

Along with construction of the new building, work is also underway on the reconfiguration of the triangular intersection of Kinnickinnic-Lincoln-Howell. It will include moving the two traffic islands to the north. A monumental sculpture will be part of the reconfiguration. Artists can submit designs that incorporate solar, wind and even "people power." Deadline for submissions is January 6, 2012.





The Neoclassical German-American Bank building was constructed in 1907. It housed Kinnickinnic Federal Savings & Loan which then became Maritime Bank. Today the site is a vacant lot awaiting construction of the new Alterra Coffee Roasters shop.

South of the Alterra lot, on the southeast corner of Kinnickinnic and Conway, is another construction project. Five buildings were demolished in September to make way for Dwell Bay View, a 70-unit apartment building and retail complex. Snap Fitness Bay View is the first retail tenant. The building is expected to be ready by July, 2012.

The first building to be demolished was the Lonefeather Trading Post built in 1924 at 2432 S. Kinnickinnic. It was the former site of William J. Hertz Cities Service Gas and Koolmotor Oil filling station. A house at 625 E. Conway, adjacent to Lonefeather, was also razed.



This Colonial Revival-style apartment building at 2438-44 S. Kinnickinnc was the second to be demolished. The original owner was John Julian, who paid Elias Stollenwerk \$7,000 to construct the building in 1907, according to the plans of architect Nicholas Dornbach.



This American Foursquare style duplex was built in 1912 at 2452 S. Kinnickinnic.



This Queen Anne home at 2460 S. Kinnickinnic was built in 1890. The house in the rear, which was also demolished, was originally a carriage house.

Visioning Session Targets Ideas for Historical Society's Future

Forty members of the Historical Society as well as representatives of various community groups assembled for an evening of iddea sharing about possible future Society directions at the Beulah Brinton House. Led by facilitator Shemagne O'Keefe, attendees produced a myriad of ideas that were synthesized into eight themes to be used as guides in determining the future work of the Historical Society:

- 1. Community Events: the BVHS and Beulah Brinton House can serve as a gathering place for informed community dialogue for all ages.
- Cultural Programs: the BVHS may be utilized as a center for cultural programs in Bay View.

- 3. Educational Programs: the Society can host educational opportunities for youth to understand the essence of the work of Beulah Brinton in a way that is relevant to their lives.
- 4. Neighborhood/Community: the BVHS can act as a clearinghouse for accessing history of neighborhood homes and buildings.
- 5. Physical Spaces and Resources:
 historically accurate restoration and
 renovation of the Beulah Brinton House
 and grounds can be physically
 accessible to all. Also, the BVHS can
 set up an endowment fund to sustain the
 house and educational programs.
- Tourism: the Brinton House can serve as a tourist destination and as the Bay View Visitor Center.

- 7. **History:** the Society can create a feeling of community for Bay View residents by highlighting the neighborhood's history and roots.
- 8. **Reputation:** the BVHS can be a leader and model for community historical societies everywhere.

BAY VIEW HISTORICAL SOCIETY MEMBER PROFILE: IOHN UTZAT

Bay View has a very rich history. A person who has done much to record and preserve this history is Mr. John H. Utzat.

Mr. Utzat was a writer for the South Side News as well as other South Side papers. He's written countless articles about many facets of Milwaukee life, including specific accounts about Bay View. Collections of some of these stories are available at the Milwaukee Public Library in the book Southside in the SUN.

Along with Ray Bethke, the first president of the Bay View Historical Society, Mr. Utzat used his encyclopedic knowledge of Bay View to design six walking tours of Bay View. These popular tours have been taken by many people over the years and walking tour attendance continues to thrive today.

As a founding member of the Bay View Historical Society, Mr. Utzat was on the Society's program committee in its early days, and we have him to thank for solving the mystery of the location of 1835 Stewart Allis Cemetery.

Currently, Mr. Utzat serves as a member of the Society's Historical Landmarks Committee, where he drives the Committee's annual decision of designating historic Bay View sites. He is also serves as the Master of Ceremonies at the designation event every year.

The BVHS is grateful for his presence and participation in the Society.
