Before assuming the Performing Arts position for Milwaukee Public Schools' Recreation Department, she taught at the UW-Eau Claire Theatre Department.

Tribute to Ray Dietrich BY RON WINKLER

Ray Dietrich, who was born August 5, 1922 and died December 6, 2013, loved music and inspired generations of Bay Viewites and residents of Milwaukee's south side. He graduated from Bay View High School (BVHS) in 1941. He then joined the U.S. Army Air Corps where he became a corporal in the 331st Bombardment Group during World War II. In 2011 he was selected as a member of the Stars & Stripes Honor Flight to Washington DC.

Upon discharge from the army, he attended the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee and in 1948 received a Bachelor's Degree in Music Education. The following year he earned his Master's of Music Degree from the University of Michigan.



Returned to his Alma Mater

He joined BVHS's music staff in 1949 and remained for 35 years until 1984. During that span as Chairman of the Music Department and Director of Choral Activities, he was responsible for the production of the school's highly acclaimed spring musicals.

He was baptized, confirmed, and, in 1948, married to Ellie Zilisch at Ascension Lutheran Church, 1236 South Layton Boulevard, where he served as Music Director from 1951-1997. He organized concerts and started voice, brass and hand bell choirs for children and adults. During that time he produced Ascension's noteworthy Christmas Candlelight Concerts. Even though his music program had strict standards for participation, with a demand for authority and respect, some families had three generations of singers trained by Dietrich. In 1998 he was honored with the title Music Director emeritus.

Between BVHS and Ascension, his life was consumed by rehearsals. After directing a

rehearsal at BVHS, he'd go to Ascension to direct a rehearsal. He credited his wife Ellie for raising their three children because he was always rehearsing. His choral groups at the church and Bay View High toured the Midwest, New York and Europe.



Bay View High School Alumni Choir

Ray came out of retirement in 2006 at the urging of former BVHS choir members to organize and conduct the 70 voice Bay View High School Alumni Choir. The alumni choir performed at BVHS in a Winter Concert and a Spring Concert in partnership with the current students. The alumni choir also performed at community events and received excellent reviews from the media.

In 2009 he received the Lifetime Achievement Award from the Milwaukee Civic Music Association. Then, at the BVHS Alumni Choir's 2011 Spring Concert, BVHS's auditorium was renamed the Raymond Dietrich Auditorium.

At Ray's funeral on Monday, December 9th at Ascension Lutheran Church, Dr. Tom Trimborn conducted the combined BVHS Alumni Choir and Ascension Senior Choir in the "Battle Hymn of the Republic." There was a large screen next to the choirs which showed a video of Ray conducting the BVHS Alumni Choir in the "Battle Hymn of the Republic." The performance on the screen and the live performance were in perfect sync so that when Ray turned around in the video to invite the audience to join in the final



refrain, Dr. Trimborn was doing the same in the church. It was Ray's way of saying "farewell" to everyone and there was not a dry eye in the congregation.

Personal inspiration

Although I was not part of Ray Dietrich's music programs, I took his music appreciation class during my senior year at BVHS. It was the beginning of my musical journey through life. Inspired by the excerpts of great music that I heard in Ray's class, I went to the library to hear the works in their entirety. Then I rode my bicycle to Radio Doctors on 3rd and Wells in downtown Milwaukee to buy classical albums. This was when I was still a high school student!

Today my wife Alice and I have season tickets to the Milwaukee Symphony Orchestra. In addition, we are involved in the music program at our church. Over the years I thanked Ray many times for the inspiration that came from his class. Music is one of my favorite leisure activities.

Ray was a member of the Bay View Historical Society and when my book Bay View came out in 2011, he sent me the following note, "What a treasure! It's wonderful for me to relive my days in Bay View. I can't praise you enough and I'm honored that you included me." He came to our house to purchase seven more copies of the book. We talked about music and he was thrilled when I presented him with a box of CDs of some of my favorite classical music.


One of Ray's favorite activities was spending time with family and friends at the Dietrich Family home on Blue Lake in

Minocqua, Wisconsin. He is survived by Ellie, his wife of 65 years as well as his children Joan (Joel) Lueneburg, Ann (Dick) Cotter and John Dietrich. He is also survived by his sister Janis (Willard) Reck and numerous grandchildren, nieces, nephews, other relatives and friends.

Ray once referred to the longevity of his tenures at BVHS and Ascension by saying, "I'm a sticker. I stay. And besides, I enjoy it." The same was true for his life; he stayed for 91 years. Thanks Ray, for the music and the memories.

DECEMBER 14TH BOOK SIGNING FOR MILWAUKEE'S TOWN OF LAKE



The multiple car accidents during the previous Sunday's snowstorm made southeastern Wisconsin's residents reluctant to venture out into the snow on Saturday. Despite the snow, those who attended the holiday party and book signing from 1:00 to 6:00 pm at the Beulah Brinton House had a good time.

Milwaukee's Town of Lake can be still be ordered or purchased at Bay View Historical Society events or at Ron's slide show presentations. Books sell for \$21.99 each and all profit goes to the Bay View Historical Society.

The Town of Lake was created in 1838 as one of Milwaukee County's seven townships. Its borders were Greenfield Avenue (north), College Avenue (south), (27th Street) west, and Lake Michigan (east). Beginning in 1850 and ending in 1954, Lake passed out of existence piecemeal as its farmland became developed and was claimed by the City of Milwaukee or incorporated to become Bay View, Cudahy, and St. Francis. The St. Francis Seminary and Convent, Cupertino tree on the lakefront, Lake Band, Lake Town Hall, Airway Theater, Lakeside Power Plant, Patrick Cudahy Company, Mitchell International Airport, Forest Home Cemetery, St. Josaphat's Basilica, Nunnemacher's Distillery, Grebe's Bakery, Gardetto's Bakery, New Coeln, and the Tippecanoe neighborhood with its landmark water tower are only a small part of what made Lake a unique area of Milwaukee County.

This is the first Town of Lake history containing abundant photos.

The book will be published in December. Books are \$21.99 each, and may be picked up on Saturday, December 14th at the Beulah Brinton House between 1:00 pm and 6:30 pm.

On the Street Where I Live BY LISA ANN JACOBSEN

Many members may remember the name of this column, which ran in previous years in the BVHS newsletter. We have decided to revive the column and here begins with the street where I live, Logan Avenue.



On April 29, 1866, over 200 veterans of the American Civil War gathered at Woodlawn Cemetery in Carbondale, Illinois to honor their fallen comrades.

Decorated soldier Major General John A. Logan gave the keynote address, telling the audience that "Every man's life belongs to his country, and no man has a right to refuse when his country calls for it." Two years later, on May 5, 1868, General Logan, now heading an organization of Union veterans called the Grand Army of the Republic, established Decoration Day as a time for the nation to decorate the graves of the war dead with flowers. Major Logan declared that Decoration Day should be observed on May 30. It is believed that date was chosen because flowers would be in bloom all over the country. The first large observance was held that year at Arlington National Cemetery, across the Potomac River from Washington, DC, with ceremonies centered around the mourningdraped veranda of the Arlington mansion, once the home of General Robert E. Lee.

Logan thought this to be "one of the proudest acts of his life. Indeed, it remains his greatest legacy. Today bronze markers located from the Atlantic to the Pacific honor Logan and his Memorial Day Order." In March 1887, Bay View, which had by that time annexed from

Milwaukee, determined Logan Avenue in honor of Major General John Alexander Logan.

The next time you drive or stroll along Logan Avenue, remember General Logan's urging that "We should guard their graves with sacred vigilance...let pleasant paths invite the coming and going of reverent visitors and fond mourners. Let no neglect, no ravages of time, testify to the present or to the coming generations that we have forgotten as a people the cost of a free and undivided republic."

HOW BAY VIEW HISTORICAL SOCIETY BEGAN

Our current Bay View Historical Society began in 1980. However, the idea of starting such an organization has been an ongoing one. For example, on April 17, 1915, a meeting was held at Dover Street School regarding the establishment of a Bay View Historical Society and a Bay View Historical Museum at the new Llewellyn Library. Attendees at that meeting were many notable Bay Viewites, including Henry Otjen, Martha Heithe, Maria Toohey, Capt. William Donahoe, James McIver, Henry Dirsch, George Haurerwas, and John Campbell. However, their ideas of a society and a museum did not come to fruition at that time.

On August 26, 1929, George Meredith, son of the first Bay View Village president, and Dan Starkey, former editor and publisher of the Bay View Herald, organized an event at Humboldt Park to celebrate Bay View's 50th birthday with over 3,500 people in attendance.

On August 25, 1979, the Bay View centennial was celebrated at South Shore Park. A centennial plaque was unveiled to mark this occasion. It is mounted on a large boulder at the northwest corner of the park at the intersection of Superior and Estes Streets. A walking tour committee was formed at this time

Shortly after the centennial, residents again discussed the idea of forming a historical society for Bay View. Exploratory meetings were held and the Bay View Historical Society was incorporated in January 1980. Ray Bethke was the first president and he gave the Society purpose and direction. Walking tours of Bay View and dedications of historic landmarks began to be held and continue to this day.

Tigers and Cubs, oh my! BY BILL O'BRIEN



Bay View Historical Society greeted some very young guests on the Saturday before Christmas for a tour of the Brinton House. Members of the Tiger Den of Cub Scout Pack 57 from Humboldt Park School showed up in their uniforms just after lunch. Accompanied by several parents and a spare big sister, they assembled in the hall for the start of the tour before I walked them out to the verge. When I asked what the strip between the walk and the curb is, one young fellow looked down and declared "Snow!" I explained how a verge is the area just before an edge, like the brackets under the edge of the gable, and how such verge boards have come to be called bargeboards.

For some neighborhood context, we looked east to see the lake and learned how early streets in Bay View paralleled or ran perpendicular to the shoreline, a contrast to the surveyors' North-South, East-West grid for most Milwaukee streets. We peered north to the stoplight, to see the south border of the steel mill site.

The tour offered the challenge of being informative and entertaining for both young and old. For the boys, I posed the route through the house as a treasure hunt and, with something like subtitles, filled the parents in as we went along about the Gothic Revival, the Columbian Exposition, the Brintons, Lincrusta, and the Society's activities.

From a slow start, with only one lad spotting the rope in the moldings of the bay window, the boys worked briskly and brightly through the treasure hunt's checklist: an author; the start of a branch library; a tennis court; an oval window (like the tiny one in the little library out front); a cellar door; a ballet studio; an excursion steamer; a steel mill picture; the smallest bedroom; a skyliaht: secret stairs.

A neighbor boy quickly solved what I thought would be the biggest stumper: a room that once had three doors. Just as I finished asking the question, he pointed to the dining room window that now fills what was once an east door to the north porch. The son of an architect, he's on my list of future tour guide recruits.

The tour was fun, chatty, and a team effort. Susan Ballje arranged it and the "treasured" cupcakes. My daughter Kate told some of the stories while Mary Fisher and Susan helped with traffic control while at the same time skimming tour guide outlines that had been prepared. As more guides are trained, we will welcome more groups like the Cubs, and be gratifyingly thanked for "pulling off the nearly impossible! Keeping the attention of our 6 and 7 year olds!" as the Den Leader wrote afterwards.

If you're still puzzling through that checklist, a New Year's visit is clearly in order.
