Double Bill for April 1st Meeting

No fooling.... there will be two presentations when the Bay View Historical Society meets next on April 1.

Bay View resident Kathleen Mohr, will present "Brave Deeds of the Petticoat Patriots".

Costumed as Betsy Ross, she will speak in the person of the seamstress credited with making the first American flag. Betsy will recall a time when our country was new and learning to stand up for its freedom. Her program focuses on the American Revolution and the part that women such as Molly Pitcher, Nancy Hart and Sybil Luddington played in it.

Then local author Anna Passante will speak about her latest book: *Dick Wiken, Milwaukee Architectural Sculptor.* Wiken

(1913-1985) was born in Milwaukee, attended Bay View High School and was a self-taught sculptor, designer and craftsman. Ms. Passante's book covers the accomplishments of his life and she will speak about them.

Passante has also authored two other books: Anarchy in Bay View's Little Italy, September 9, 1917 and the Shocking Aftermath and A God-given Talent: Peter J. Brust, Architect: His Work and Legacy, 1906-2006.

### Community: A Place Where We All Belong

Bay View Historical Society is dedicated to further building community through knowledge of the area's significant history. With BVHS mission in focus, we are building relationships with four area schools and studying the Port of Milwaukee. This project is funded by the Wisconsin Humanities Council mini-grant awarded in June.

The grant has several components that are designed to bring students from Bay View schools into the community in order to study area history and get a sense of community. Members are involved as resources and support the students' study to keep their interests alive and relevant.

The Education Committee for BVHS (including Susan Ballje, Nancy Tawney, Kathy Mulvey, Ann White, Stephanie Harling and Robin Kitzrow) has reached out to Clement Avenue, Fernwood Montessori, Humboldt Park, and Trowbridge schools. During the summer, BVHS members and staff from the four schools met to study Peter Block's book Community: The Structure of Belonging and the Port of Milwaukee. We enjoyed a field trip through the port and were amazed with the history, commerce,

# Encyclopedia of Milwaukee ENCYCLOPEDIA OF MILWAUKEE

UWM professor Amanda Seligman spoke to members of the Bay View Historical Society on February 4th about the creation of an encyclopedia of Milwaukee. Projected to be launched in 2017, this will be a comprehensive work covering the Milwaukee metropolitan area. It will have approximately 720 entries with illustrations, maps and photographs as well as a comprehensive bibliography and footnotes.

Subject areas will include: arts and culture, business, industry, labor and agriculture, education, gender and sexuality, health and medicine, media and communications, natural and built

### Bay View High School to Celebrate 100th Anniversary

Bay View High School will celebrate its 100th anniversary in 2014 with a celebration during the weekend of October 3-5, 2014. Events being planned are a Friday evening icebreaker and Saturday football game and tours of the school. The highlight of the weekend will be the dinner on Saturday evening at the Italian Community Center in Milwaukee's Historic Third Ward. The Italian Community Center was chosen because of its capacity, location and ample free parking. Ray Dietrich is planning to conduct the Bay View High School Alumni Choir as part of the evening's entertainment.

Ron Winkler and John Giove will coauthor a picture book that will combine the school's 100 year history with current events and popular culture. Giove is a 1960 alumnus of Bay View High who started his teaching career in 1965 at John Muir Junior High School. At the request of Principal Arthur Showers, he "came home" to Bay View High where he spent the rest of his career from lanuary, 1967 to 2001.

The anniversary committee is comprised of an enthusiastic, multigenerational group of alumni. It includes 1972 alumna Robin Kitzrow who was principal at Fritsche Middle School before she finished her career as principal of Bay View High School.

### ANNUAL BAY VIEW TRAGEDY COMMEMORATION WILL BE HELD ON SUNDAY, MAY 5

The Wisconsin Labor History Society will observe the 127th anniversary of the Bay View Tragedy on Sunday, May 5th at 3:00 pm. On the fifth of May in 1886, thousands of Milwaukee workers marched peacefully to the Bay View Rolling Mills as part of a nationwide effort to bring about the eight hour work day. As marchers approached the mill, the state militia fired upon them, killing seven. This was the bloodiest labor disturbance in Wisconsin's history and began a new struggle for a more humane workplace. One hundred twenty five years later, the annual commemoration of this historic event will be held on May 5th at the State Historical Marker grounds on the corner of Superior Street and Russell Avenue.

Immediately following the commemoration, everyone is invited to proceed two blocks south to the reception at the Beulah Brinton House, 2590 S. Superior Street. Beer, soda and hot dogs will be available for purchase.

intermodal transportation, and opportunities that exist.

During the fall, Historical Society members and school staff were connecting with resources that are of interest to students and the history of the Port of Milwaukee. BVHS provided a workshop in December that included a treasure chest of materials and books for classrooms about the port. BVHS members visited schools to support student interests and needs.

In February, the education committee hosted a workshop *Thinking like a Historian* for school staff at the Beulah Brinton House featuring John Gurda. Participants discussed how a historian works and what is of particular interest to students in their classrooms. John shared very significant information about the port and people including the Kashubian immigration to Milwaukee in the late 1800s and the many ethnic groups that followed. Staff had the opportunity to request specific resources and activities for students to use this spring.

The culmination of the project, "Community: A Place Where We All Belong", is an exhibition of student work. Students will share what they've learned with their peers and members of the community and will have time for conversation and feedback from visitors. The expected date for the student exhibition is Sunday, May 5th from 1:00 until 3:00 pm at the Beulah Brinton House prior to the Tragedy of Bay View Commemoration.

## Annual August Walk to Feature Tippecanoe Neighborhood

Mark your calendars for this year's August Walk to be held on Saturday, August 3rd starting at 9:30 am. This year's walk will be in the area centered around Howell and Howard, known as Tippecanoe. It will be a preview of *Milwaukee's Town of Lake* which will be published by Arcadia Publishing Company in December.

This is where pioneers James Howard, Isaac Austin and Morgan Burdick had their farms. It is where the Lake Town Hall was located (now the site of Tippecanoe Library). We will see the new Lake Town Hall on 6th and Howard, St. Veronica Catholic Church, Resurrection Lutheran Church, Woodlawn

Cemetery and the homes of Tom Van Beck, Morgan Burdick and John Saveland. We will also see Saveland Park adjacent to John Saveland's home and Tippecanoe Presbyterian Church, built on the foundation of John Saveland's dance hall, which itself was built on the foundation of Isaac Austin's barn. The area north of Howard Avenue was John Saveland's real estate development which features a diverse housing stock with the lots east of Howell Avenue being some of the largest in the city.

Several long-term residents of Forest Home Cemetery will be resurrected for a day as the cemetery presents its free Memorial Day program on Monday, May 27th from noon until 3:00 pm. This year's program will take place in the Victorian Gardens in the northwest corner of the cemetery, located at 2405 West Forest Home Avenue. The historical figures will include Fred Usinger, Henry Harnischfeger,

Horace Chase and beer barons Jacob Best and August Krug. Meat packer John Layton will be portrayed by the Bay View Historical Society's Ron Winkler. These historic figures will be at their headstones as they present entertaining "autobiographical" talks. There will be plenty of free parking and refreshments will be available for purchase.

### Milwaukee's Town of Lake to be Published

Arcadia Publishing Company will publish Milwaukee's Town of Lake in its "Images of America" series this coming December. Ron Winkler is writing the text about this colorful area that went out of existence when the last nine square miles consolidated with the City of Milwaukee on April 6, 1954.

The Town of Lake's original borders were from Greenfield Avenue on the north to College Avenue on the south between 27th Street and Lake Michigan. Within its borders are found the Forest Home Cemetery, Mitchell International Airport, St. Francis Seminary, Patrick Cudahy Company and the Art Deco

water tower on 6th and Howard. It includes the cities of Cudahy and St. Francis as well as the Bay View and Tippecanoe neighborhoods. Lake was the birthplace of Grebe's and Gardetto's Bakeries and had the Lakeside power plant until it was razed in 1987. The area also contains numerous churches, schools and parks. All of this and much more will be a part of the illustrated history of an important part of Milwaukee County.
